






EPHESIANS 6:4

Fathers, You Have the Power to Shape Lives

Your influence matters — you shape hearts, futures, and faith.





Intentional Fathers leave a Lasting Impact



Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.



Context of Ephesians 6:4

Paul was addressing a Roman world shaped by extreme patriarchal authority.

Roman Law: Patria Potestas – "The Father's Power"

- Fathers held absolute legal control over their families:
 - Could sell children as slaves
 - Could punish or even execute them
 - III Children were seen as property, not people

Eph 6:4 (First Part)

Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger...

The Greek word for "provoke" is parorgizō which means:

- To exasperate
- To enrage
- To agitate to the point of resentment


Fathers can provoke their children by:

- Harsh discipline reacting in anger instead of correction.
- Inconsistency saying one thing and doing another.
- Neglect being physically present but emotionally absent.
- Perfectionism setting unreachable expectations.
- Comparison "Why can't you be more like your brother/sister/ cousin?"
- Public shaming correcting a child in front of others to "teach a lesson."

God's Fatherhood is different:

- In Psalm 103:13 God is described as a compassionate Father, showing mercy to those who fear Him.
- In Hosea 11:3–4, God portrays Himself as a tender and nurturing Father teaching His child to walk, healing them, and leading them with kindness and cords of love.

Our tone and attitude can either draw children toward the Father or drive them away from Him.



Let us reflect the heart of our Heavenly Father that is full of grace, truth, and compassion.

Eph 6:4 (Second Part)

Fathers, ...but bring them up....


The Greek word for "bring them up" is *ektrephete* which means:

- To nourish
- To feed

- To cherish
- To care for tenderly

- Fatherhood is more than providing; it's nurturing with patience and intentionality.
- It's not a passive role, but an active commitment to raise children in a thriving environment.

In the biblical worldview, fatherhood is **not** a **position of dominance**, but a **calling to nurture** and **shepherd** the lives God has entrusted to you.



Fatherhood is a calling to nurture and shepherd the lives God has entrusted to you. This includes:

- Physical nurturing providing food, shelter, and safety.
- Emotional nurturing creating a stable, loving environment where children feel secure.
- Spiritual nurturing leading them to know and love the Lord.

Fathers, you're not just raising children—you're shaping hearts with the grace of God.

Eph 6:4 (Third Part)

...in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.

In Greek,

- "Discipline" paideia means training, correction, or instruction through action.
- "Instruction" *nouthesia* means to verbal teaching, counsel, or admonition; spoken truth with the aim of guiding the mind and heart.

Eph 6:4 (Third Part)

...in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.

Together, these two terms point to a balanced approach:

- Discipline with grace.
- Permissiveness with boundaries.

The goal is not merely to raise "good kids," but to raise godly children.


"Of the Lord" means:

- Instruction rooted in Scripture, not culture.
- Discipline that reflects God's character, not human anger.
- Teaching that points them to Christ, not just personal opinion.

We cannot give what we do not have.

If the instruction we are to give is "of the Lord," then we ourselves must be walking with the Lord.

Let the Word of Christ dwell richly in us, so it may overflow into our home.



Summary



Ephesians 6:4 isn't a to-do list. It's a God-breathed vision for fatherhood. A vision that says:

- Don't provoke—but reflect the heart of your Heavenly Father, who is compassionate and slow to anger.
- Bring them up—not with force or fear, but with gentle and patient nurture, just like Christ tenderly cares for His Church.
- Discipline & Instruct them—not merely in morality, but in the life-giving Word of the Lord, shaping souls for eternity.
