









13 "You are the salt of the earth. But if the salt loses its saltiness, how can it be made salty again? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trampled underfoot.

14 "You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. 15 Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. 16 In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.

MATTHEW 5:13-16


Salt and Light are for service, not show



Salt in biblical times

- Salt was extremely valuable in biblical times
- Roman soldiers were sometimes paid in salt, a practice that gave rise to the English words "salary" and "salaried"
- Key component in ceremonial offerings

Salt in the ancient world was valuable and long-lasting just like godly character.




When we live with integrity, justice, honor, and biblical values, our influence impacts people quietly but powerfully.


Influence grows through faithfulness, not fame

For the earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of the Lord as the waters cover the sea.

HABAKKUK 2:14

Influence in God's Kingdom doesn't explode overnight like viral videos. It grows as we represent Jesus in everyday life — being faithful in small things.





One man's quiet faithfulness started a chain reaction that changed history - without ever standing on a stage himself.

Christ gave His life, not build His brand

5 In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:

6 Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage; 7 rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. 8 And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death— even death on a cross!

9 Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, 10 that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow in heaven and on earth and under the earth, 11 and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

PHILIPPIANS 2:5-11

Our influence should lift up His name, not ours.
